## Big Game Fluorocarbon the hot ticket on "Freedom" Tanner Bank trip



Berkley's Big Game Fluorocarbon Leader Material was the hot ticket for hooking Bluefin on the *Freedom's* Tanner Bank Trip. Check out what Berkley Pro Staffer Steve Carson had to say about the new Big Game Fluorocarbon Leader after a recent 6 day trip.

"Just thought I would let you know that I just returned from a 6-day long range trip to Guadalupe Island. The nicer grade 40 to 120-pound yellowfin tuna were biting, and as usual for Guadalupe the tuna were finicky and required a fluorocarbon leader to get bit. I was absolutely 'on fire', and caught 14 of the total 52 big tuna we caught during a 2-day period, using 50-pound Trilene Big Game clear mono with a 5-foot leader of 60 lb. Big Game Aqua Blue Fluorocarbon, attached with a 4-turn Surgeon's Knot (zero failures).



There is no doubt in my mind the Aqua Blue color made all the difference in coaxing bites from the reluctant tuna. It is the right shade of light blue that has long been favored by west coast tuna anglers.

I also leaned very hard on the fish, fighting them with the 'rail technique', with no break offs.

There has been some difficulty with previous PF fluorocarbon products being accepted among the San Diego long range tuna fishing fraternity. This product, (specifically in the Aqua Blue color) can be unequivocally recommended for this most brutal of fishing techniques."



throughout the day and Captain Lee advised trying a big slab cut from fresh bonito hooked well onto the dropper loop. Jim Hardan of Temple City was fishing with his long time fishing buddy Jim Dunkle of Azusa and they both agreed to give the bonito slabs a try.

Hardan fished deep, on the bottom, and used straight 40-pound Big Game Trilene and an Owner 2/0 hook off the dropper. While Hardan was cranking his bait back off the bottom, it was seized by one of the classic yellowtail that inhabit the Cortez Bank. The fight took Hardan around the boat and back again and was, as Hardan said, "one of the toughest" he'd had in a long while. The fish would prove to be good enough to win the jackpot money at an estimated weight of close to 40 pounds.

Late in the afternoon, Captain Lee called for "Last Casts" and a few more fish came over the rail. Then it was time to head back to 22nd Street Landing with a 10- to 12-hour ride to go.

Many stories would be told of all the great fishing this year on the *WON/Freedom* trip, but it would be the fish counts that tell the tale: 91 bonito; 18 whitefish; 4 sheepshead; 21 sculpin; 20 bluefin tuna; 61 yellowtail.

I asked veteran skipper Woody Woodcock, second Captain of *Freedom*, what he might attribute the success of the boat this year. "We always encourage people to fish small hooks and light line. We work with them while they have fish on and we show them the right way to do it," explained Captain Woody. "And we go the extra distance, not just stopping at Tanner or San Clemente Island, but coming

all the way out to the Cortez Bank to get fish. That's why we have had such a great year," he concluded.

## Oxnard boats take BIG bonito, lings and several bugs before weather turns surly

OXNARD — The *Coral Sea* completed several runs to San Nicolas Island bringing back 20-pound lingcod, 10-pound sheepshead and some big bonito to boot. Jeff Morgan of Channel Islands Sportfishing Center was most excited about two of the latest bits of news for the landing. "The *Black Pearl* is returning to our landing this month. The *Pearl* is a solid fiberglass 65 by 19-foot deluxe sportfisher with all of the latest electronics and amenities. The *Black Pearl* is owned by Al Gregg and Rick Craddick, and operated by 28-year sportfishing veteran skipper, Rick Craddick," explained Morgan, pausing for breath. Morgan continued, "And we have started our hoop net nights every Friday and Saturday with fishing and hoop netting for lobster and crab departing at 5:30 p.m."

The *Aloha Spirit* out of Captain Hooks, along with the *Speed Twin* have been getting some action of their own. The *Spirit* went down the coast to pick up white seabass, scoring a 45-pound croaker for Pete Peyalls of Oxnard. The *Speed Twin* made a couple of trips to Anacapa Island, bringing back huge lingcod weighing as much as 24 pounds. With 65-degree surface temps the waters around Oxnard/Ventura may be the warmest in the So-Cal area.

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# Sacramento salmon run so far worse than last year's

**SACRAMENTO** — Dick Poole, head of Water4Fish, a grassroots organization of sports and commercial anglers dedicated to ensuring adequate water quantity and quality for fish, has just issued his latest newsletter, and it doesn't contain much in the way of good news about the status of the Sacramento River 2008 fall king salmon run.

"The news is mixed, but is mainly bad for a 2009 fishing season," said Poole. "At the end of September, too, only 700 fall-run salmon had passed through the weir counter at the entrance to Battle Creek in the upper Sacramento

River. Last year at the same date 6,500 had passed and as recently as 2003, a total of 25,000 had passed.

"Hopefully, the run is just late, but the figures are disturbing, particularly since there was no fishing season this year. Jack counts are also low. As of October 6th, Coleman hatchery had 3,000 fish in its holding pond. They will immediately start spawning these fish. Coleman needs approximately 10,000 fish to make its egg quota. More data on the final run size will be available by the end of October." There was a bit of good news

coming from Coleman Hatchery, though. The Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service have just completed a massive fish ladder enlargement project, enlarging it by 10 times over the old one. It will greatly improve fish passage on Battle Creek, a tributary of the Sacramento River, helping salmon and steelhead to swim upstream while enabling work to collect salmon at the hatchery to continue uninterrupted.

The annual Return of the Salmon Festival will be held Saturday, Oct. 18, and visitors will be able to see the new ladder and observe fish in the creek, the hatchery's holding ponds and in some parts of the new ladder.
